# Leadership Message









#### **Our Board**

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CESO was created to be a catalyst for stronger economies and better lives. The ever-evolving pandemic that deepened inequalities and reversed economic gains emboldened us to innovate and accelerate our promise and purpose. During the last 12 months, we embraced every opportunity to address the pressing development issues of our time.

We became the implementing partner of the Canada-CARICOM Expert Deployment Mechanism in April 2021. In the first year of the program, we responded to requests for technical assistance from national governments across the Caribbean, supporting essential efforts to diversify economies in a region reeling from the pandemic's devastating impact on tourism.

During year two of the Global Affairs Canada funded Accelerating Women's Empowerment program, more than 4,000 people across 21 countries enhanced their skills and knowledge, and beneficiaries of the Innovation Micro-Fund piloted solutions for business growth. Even during travel restrictions, 161 new partnerships took root and flourished, advancing resilient livelihoods and gender equality.

The climate emergency demanded our focus on low-carbon economies and the responsibly sourced minerals that power green technologies. Strengthening good governance in the mining sector was the focus of the Supporting the Ministry of Mines program in Ethiopia, which marked its successful completion in June 2022 having equipped 12,973 trainees for the future of natural resource governance needed for sustainable development. As illustrated by the impacts of our MERIT project in Mongolia, we're dedicated to the accountable management of the resource sector to achieve locally driven social, economic and environmental goals.

Responsible resource exploration also brought business and procurement opportunities to Canada's Indigenous communities. Our capacity-building services in a variety of sectors contributed to the self-determination of Indigenous Nations from coast to coast to coast. During 156 volunteer assignments, we collaborated with leaders of Indigenous Nations, organizations, institutions and businesses to respond to pandemic challenges, strengthen local governance and achieve economic development goals.

While skillfully managing a transition out of lockdown, CESO staff accelerated volunteer recruitment and prepared for the much-anticipated return to in-person volunteering. This is just one of the exciting prospects that we're delighted to embrace.

An ambitious evolution will allow us to better tell the story of our organization and our role as a leader in economic development. We look forward to embarking on this journey with you.

In the spirit of peace, friendship and respect, we recognize that our work takes place on traditional Indigenous territories across Canada.




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
